

COLORADO COALITION FOR THE HOMELESS STATE ADVOCACY UPDATE

For the Period of: 2/1/10 – 2/15/10

Highlights:

Of the 504 bills that have been introduced this legislative session, **the Coalition is following 36 related to housing, health care, criminal justice reform, benefits acquisition and balancing the state budget.** Eleven bills are in play right now.

- A bill that would eliminate fees for Colorado State ID's and birth certificates for people being released from correctional facilities, aging out of the foster care system or who are homeless has passed out of its first Senate Committee on February 4th and now moves to Appropriations for further debate. **This bill would help many of the Coalition's clients that are dealing with barriers to obtaining employment, housing or benefits due to the lack of an ID.**
- A bill that attempts to streamline the food stamp application and increase the number of people receiving food stamps (currently, only 51% of those eligible in Colorado are receiving benefits) passed out of the House Health and Human Services Committee on February 11th and now moves to Appropriations. By increasing the number of food stamp recipients, Colorado will be able to draw down additional federal matching funds, therefore saving the state money. **By removing the asset test for food stamps, struggling families will be able to retain savings to cushion them against financial uncertainties and better climb out of poverty.**
- Next week, a bill that would reduce the liability on an employer who hires a person with a prior felony history, will face its first hurdle in the Senate. **This bill would directly benefit clients that face difficulty obtaining employment due to a criminal history and is expected to help reduce recidivism.**
- This week, 8 bills aimed at filling the hole in the 2010-2011 Colorado budget passed out of the House and the Senate and are now on their way to the Governor's desk. These revenue enhancing bills eliminate several tax exemptions and credits including; eliminating a sales tax exemption for candy and soda and eliminating a sales tax exemption for online purchases. Governor's staff estimates that these measures will raise \$131.8 million for Fiscal Year 2010-11.

This bill would permit RTD to negotiate and enter into similar agreements for the provision of residential and other uses at transfer facilities, as long as such uses are consistent with local laws relating to planning and zoning. The bill also eliminates a provision prohibiting such agreements if they create a competitive disadvantage for nearby businesses. With the recommendation of the district attorney and approval of the original court, a veteran's case may be transferred from the original jurisdiction to the Veterans court. When a veteran with a mental health or substance abuse problem is found guilty, the court has the discretion to not enter the judgment and instead place the defendant in a supervision program. Upon approval and calculation by a nonprofit intermediary, the bill allows a taxpayer to claim a credit of 25% of any donation made to a qualified nonprofit organization that has applied to the nonprofit intermediary for the ability to solicit donations for purposes of creating nonprofit jobs. The total amount of the credits available in a calendar year is \$1 million. The bill allows the nonprofit intermediary to review the applications of nonprofit organizations and determine if the applications meet the necessary qualifications. For the 2010-11 fiscal year, transfers to the General Fund all of the tobacco settlement moneys annually transferred to the Comprehensive Primary and Preventive Care Grant Program. The bill reallocates the transfer of tobacco settlement moneys from the Colorado Indigent Care Program to the Children’s Basic Health Plan Trust.
