INTRODUCTION THE 2021 LEGISLATIVE SESSION WAS A WATERSHED IN BOLSTERING EQUITY AND RESOURCES FOR MARGINALIZED COMMUNITIES ACROSS COLORADO.

After nearly 18 months of non-stop legislative work since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic, the session officially wrapped up on Tuesday, June 8th, on the 116th day of the constitutionally allowable 120. Legislators embraced Governor Polis' charge to "Build Back Stronger" as they worked to allocate the substantial infusion of time-limited, pandemic-related funding and pursue permanent reforms. Of the 623 bills that were introduced, 502 passed. While Democrats maintain control of the House (41-24 majority), Senate (20-15 majority), and Governorship, 91 percent of the legislation that passed received bipartisan support. Speaker of the House, Alec Garnett, and President of the Senate, Leroy Garcia, led the work in their respective chambers.

After facing a devastating pandemic-related budget shortfall in 2020 and having to make cuts to essential programs and services, Colorado was in a much more favorable budget environment in 2021. The state received and directed substantial infusion of time-limited, pandemic-related federal funding to address the state's recovery needs. In addition to \$3.8 billion in federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds, the legislature was able to advance an \$800 million stimulus package from the state General Fund thanks to a surplus in income and sales tax revenue. The package targeted community revitalization, workforce development, energy assistance, behavioral health services, and housing, among other priorities. Most of this funding must be allocated by 2024 and fully expended by 2026.

As always, the Education and Advocacy (E&A) team, could not have done the work it did without the support and expertise of the entire CCH community. Despite challenges posed by the pandemic, Coalition staff and clients were able to provide written testimony or comments on seven bills and virtual or in-person testimony on eight. CCH's Advocacy Committee also participated in a virtual Lobby Day where participants had an opportunity to learn about the Coalition's priority bills, practice lobbying skills, and record statements in support of the bills that were sent to target legislators. CCH sent 23 recorded messages to legislators asking for their support.

The Coalition actively engaged on 39 bills, 38 of which were introduced. Of these, 37 resulted in favorable outcomes. In total, CCH tracked 102 bills, 90 of which passed and 12 of which were killed. E&A helped shape the policy process through drafting language, participating in stakeholder convenings, engaging in direct lobbying, giving testimony, sending action alerts to the Coalition's network of over 15,000 individuals, writing letters, and generating support on social media. Community members sent 3,204 messages to legislators in support of the organization's priorities. The Coalition is also grateful to its contract lobbyist, Danny McCarthy, with Mendez Consulting, for his tireless work, skillful negotiation, and talent for changing narratives around homelessness under the Gold Dome.

The Colorado Coalition for the Homeless (the Coalition, CCH) advocated for critical legislation related to investments in affordable housing, equitable rental assistance, services for people experiencing homelessness including bills that:

PRIORITIES THE COALITION FOCUSED ON THE FOLLOWING CRITICAL NEEDS OF PEOPLE EXPERIENCING HOMELESS AND LIVING IN POVERTY FOR THE 2021 LEGISLATIVE SESSION:





housing

This was a banner year for investment in affordable housing and creative housing policy. CCH helped shape and lobby for four successful bills. One bill, SB21-242 (Senators Gonzales and Pettersen; Representatives Gonzales-Gutierrez and Woodrow), provides \$30 million for the rental, acquisition, and renovation of underutilized hotels and motels to provide shelter and affordable housing to people experiencing homelessness. It also expands eligibility for rental assistance and supportive services to include people experiencing homelessness. The Coalition's experience with using hotel and motel space for Protective Action and Activated Respite at the height of the COVID-19 pandemic for people experiencing homelessness informed the drafting of this critical bill. It passed 22 (yes)-14 (no)-1 (excused) in the Senate and 42-22-1 in the House.

HB21-1271 (Representatives McCluskie and Jodeh; Senator Gonzales) promotes innovative housing solutions by creating three new programs in the Department of Local Affairs (DOLA). The new programs include local government affordable housing development incentives grant program, the local government planning grant program, and the affordable housing guided toolkit and local officials guide program. The appropriation to DOLA includes \$13 million from the General Fund and \$35 million in federal American Rescue Plan Act funds. CCH was able to provide the nonprofit housing developer perspective and help refine allowable uses. The bill passed in the Senate on a vote of 42-22-2 and in the House on a vote of 22-14-0.

(Representatives Ricks and Bradfield; Senator Bridges), creates a rent reporting pilot program for 10 landlords and 100 tenants to be administered by the Colorado Housing and Finance Authority. This bill will explore how reporting tenants' rent payments to credit reporting agencies impacts their credit scores and visibility. Poor credit and lack of credit are a significant barrier to homeownership, particularly for people of color. Rent is the biggest expense for most households, and tenants should get credit for paying on time and in full. If the impact among the lowestincome participants is positive, CCH hopes to help craft future legislation to build on the pilot. Thanks, in part, to powerful testimony by Amritpal Byrd, Compliance Manager with CCH's Renaissance Property Management Corporation, the bill passed on votes of 43-20-2 in the House and 20-15-0 in the Senate.

Finally, days before the legislative session concluded, HB21-1329 (Representatives Gonzales-Gutierrez and Woodrow; Senators Holbert and Gonzales) passed, creating the Affordable Housing and Home Ownership Cash Fund in the State Treasury and authorizing the appropriation of \$550M in funding from the American Rescue Plan Act. A legislative interim committee will make policy recommendations for the use of these funds, and homeless service providers and nonprofit developers are establishing their role in the conversation. The Coalition intends to work closely with committee members and community partners to ensure this once-ina-lifetime appropriation is utilized effectively and equitably. It passed 40-23-2 and 34-0-1 in the House and Senate, respectively.

renters' protections

In partnership with our friends at Enterprise Community Partners, Colorado Center on Law and Policy, 9to5 Colorado, COVID-19 Eviction Defense Project, Interfaith Alliance of Colorado, and Together Colorado, the Coalition was a leader in passing landmark renters' protections. The Coalition's priority bill, SB21-173 (Senators Gonzales and Moreno; Representatives Caraveo and Gonzales-Gutierrez), has several sweeping, permanent reforms that will take effect on October 1, 2021, including:

- Limiting late fees assessed to residential tenants to the greater of \$50 or 5% of the rent owed and establishing a seven-day grace period between when rent is due and when a fee can be charged,
- Establishing tenants' right to pay backrent at any time during the eviction process until the time of judgement,
- Enabling tenants to assert their rights under the warranty of habitability statute,
- Ensuring court summons contain information on rental and legal assistance,
- Guaranteeing seven days to prepare for trial, and
- Establishing meaningful damages for tenants illegally locked out of their home. The bill passed with votes of 19-15-1 in the Senate and 39-24-2 in the House.

Additionally, the Coalition helped to craft and advocate for a pair of bills that came out of the Division of Housing in the Department of Local Affairs. The first, HB21-1054 (Representative Jackson; Senator Gonzales),

creates, unless otherwise required by federal law, an exception to the requirement that an applicant for federal, state, or local public benefits verify lawful presence in the United States for housing assistance. This will greatly reduce the barrier to necessary housing supports for Colorado's immigrant population. The bill passed with votes of 41-24-0 and 20-14-1 in the House and Senate, respectively. The second, HB21-1121 (Representatives Jackson and Jodeh; Senator Gonzales), limits the frequency with which a landlord can increase rent to once within a continuous 12-month tenancy, guarantees 60 days' notice of a rent increase to tenants without a written lease, and prohibits a sheriff from executing a writ of restitution until at least 10 days after judgment. This will give tenants more time to find alternative housing arrangements or storage options in the event of an eviction, helping to prevent homelessness. The bill passed40-23-2 in the House and 19-15-1 in the Senate.

CCH was also a stakeholder in an effort to create a statewide eviction moratorium with a strategic phase-out approach to avoid eviction, displacement, and homelessness during the pandemic. While this bill was never introduced, legislators took action to prevent eviction by allocating \$1.5 million to the Colorado's Eviction Legal Defense Fund in addition to \$1.6 million from the General Fund and Proposition EE. The Coalition will continue to push for additional resources to prevent homelessness before it occurs during the public health emergency and beyond. The Coalition weighed in on three key healthcare policies. First, led by the Colorado Center on Law and Policy, HB21-1198 (Representative Jodeh; Senators Buckner and Kolker) directs healthcare facilities to screen uninsured patients for eligibility for public health insurance programs and discounted care, implements transparent limits on hospital bills and monthly payments for Coloradans at or below 250 percent of the federal poverty level, and provides strong enforcement mechanisms so patients can assert their rights to fair billing practices. It passed 40-24-1 in the House and 20-15-0 in the Senate.

Second, in partnership with the Colorado Community Health Network (CCHN), CCH supported HB21-1275 (Representatives Lontine and Will; Senators Ginal and Kirkmeyer). This bill makes pharmacists eligible for reimbursement under Medicaid for certain medically necessary services. By adding clinical services provided by a pharmacist to the Medicaid State Plan, these costs will be considered allowable costs in the Federally Qualified Health Center cost report which determines reimbursements. It passed with particularly strong bipartisan support with votes of 57-8-0 in the House and 35-0-0 in the Senate.

Third, CCH successfully advocated for the restoration of funding for the Adult Dental Benefit that was cut during the 2020 legislative session through SB21-211 (Senator Moreno; Representative Herod). Organizations like the Coalition and low- to no-income patients themselves will feel the positive impacts of these pieces of legislation. This bill also garnered a great deal of support from both sides of the aisle with votes of 33-0-2 in the Senate and 49-14-1 in the House.

healthcare

public safety

Public safety and criminal justice reform were important issue areas this year as the country continues to become more attune to the injustice these systems inflict on black and brown people, especially those living in poverty. CCH partnered with the Fraternal Order of Police, STAR Program administrators, Summit County's SMART team, and other advocates to advance HB21-1030 (Reps. McCluskie & McKean, Sens. Buckner & Cooke). The bill expands the Peace Officers Mental Health Support Grant Program to include a co-responder community responses model and increases funding from \$2 million to \$3 million per year. Outreach Behavioral Health Navigator, Kara

Heller, testified in support of the bill on behalf of CCH. The community partnerships fostered by this bill will encourage de-escalation in crisis situations and will help connect people to essential services including housing. The bill passed with strong bipartisan support with votes of 57-6-2 in the House and 35-0-0 in the Senate.

CCH was also active in a successful effort to continue Colorado's Necessary Documents Program through SB21-018 (Senator Moreno; Representative Esgar). Coloradans need identification documents to open bank accounts, cash checks, pick up prescriptions, board planes, and access health care, housing, employment, and public benefits.

For people experiencing homelessness, these documents are frequently at risk of being lost, stolen, and confiscated, and the average \$50 replacement cost can be prohibitive. The bill continues the Necessary Documents Program indefinitely, providing vouchers for people to obtain identification documents without cost. It is administered by the Office of Health Equity in the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment at an annual cost of \$300,000 to the General Fund. E&A is grateful to our partners at Colorado Center on Law and Policy and Metro Caring for leading this charge, and to CCH Vocational Specialist, Brian Vander Heiden, and Vocational Services client, Glen Williams, for providing support and expert testimony. The bill passed with votes of 44-20-1 in the House and 31-3-1 in the Senate.

essential benefits

LOOKING Forward



With 2021 legislative session in the rearview, CCH shifts its focus to influence interim committees charged with allocating stimulus dollars and make policy recommendations on housing and behavioral health. The organization pledges to effectively implement the bills that support vulnerable populations through education, regulatory work, and outcome tracking. Collaboration with partners to develop lasting solutions to homelessness and mitigate the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic remains a priority as we begin to plan for the 2022 session.
