

Introduction

Each year the Colorado Balance of State (BoS) Continuum of Care (CoC) conducts a Point-in-Time (PIT) study on homelessness in Colorado's non-metro and rural counties. This year the PIT count was held on the night of Tuesday, January 25th, 2022. The PIT count has two major goals:

- Obtain an unduplicated count of individuals and families meeting the HUD definition of homelessness (<u>definitions here</u>)
- Capture information about demographic characteristics, disabling conditions, and subpopulations related to homelessness



The CO BoS CoC covers 54 counties across Colorado.

The Balance of State CoC covers Colorado's 54 non-metro and rural counties. This includes all counties outside of metro Denver, Colorado Springs, and Northern Colorado. Since 2020, Northern Colorado has been designated by HUD as a separate CoC². Seventeen counties participated in the 2022 PIT count³.

PIT counts are required to be conducted at least biennially by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) as a condition of applying for HUD homeless assistance funds. PIT counts are important because they are the only count conducted nationally each year, they provide data to quantify the scope of homelessness, and they

help national, state, and local policymakers track progress towards the goal of ending homelessness. Ultimately, PIT data are used to help determine federal funding that goes toward fighting homelessness. The Annual Homeless Assessment Report (AHAR⁴) is prepared by HUD for the U.S. Congress, providing estimates and information about people experiencing homelessness across the country by reporting on those who have experienced homelessness and on the availability of shelter and other support systems. The AHAR also includes a nationwide bed inventory that is informed by PIT data. PIT count data are also used to estimate how different populations of people experience homelessness, such as those with severe mental illness, veterans, unaccompanied youth, people living with HIV/AIDs, or those who are chronically homeless.

Impact of COVID-19

The 2022 PIT count was conducted during the COVID-19 pandemic. As the COVID-19 pandemic remained an issue in early 2022, some shelters continued to have reduced capacity because of social distancing requirements, and some individuals experiencing homelessness likely did not seek shelter due to fears of being near other people or because wearing a mask was challenging. With the COVID-19 pandemic, it

should be noted that there may be many unforeseen impacts of pandemic response efforts on the number of people experiencing homelessness who were surveyed in this year's PIT count. Additionally, given the vast geographic distances between counties in the Balance of State Continuum of Care, these impacts may look different across counties.

In addition to changes from HUD and potential unforeseen impacts, COVID-19 has resulted in trainings taking place online and fewer volunteers for the count than in pre-COVID-19 years. Many coordinators and agency staff members were overburdened due to the pandemic, and the time and effort they dedicated to the 2022 count is appreciated.

Methodology

During even numbered years, the CoC conducts a sheltered PIT count. During odd numbered years, the CoC conducts both a sheltered and unsheltered PIT count. As such, in 2022, the CoC conducted a sheltered PIT count of individuals and families across the state. The PIT count was conducted in accordance with the HUD methodology guide⁵ and the HUD data collection notice⁶ for the 2022 count. The survey instrument was developed by the Colorado Coalition for the Homeless (CCH), in consultation with their research partner, OMNI Institute.

For the **sheltered count**, the CoC counted all individuals and families "living in a supervised publicly or privately operated shelter designated to provide temporary living arrangements (including congregate shelters, transitional housing, and hotels and motels paid for by charitable organizations or by federal, state, or local government programs for low-income individuals)" on the night designated for the count.

Regional PIT Coordinators throughout the state were responsible for planning and conducting the PIT count in their regions. CCH provided all staff and volunteers with training materials uploaded to the CCH website and all coordinators with additional tailored trainings to meet their regions' specific needs. On January 25th, service provider staff and volunteers administered the PIT survey to sheltered people experiencing homelessness in seventeen counties within the Balance of State CoC region.

An online survey hosted on Survey123 was developed in 2021. Data collection for the 2022 PIT took place using a similar survey updated using HUD's 2022 guidance. All participating agencies were provided with a link to the online sheltered survey. Agencies independently input their sheltered data into the survey form using this link.

OMNI then carried out a thorough review of the PIT survey data. The research team performed numerous checks to identify data entry errors, logic errors, and duplicate surveys. A total of 39 people were removed in the data cleaning process – 3 people were removed due to data quality issues (missing name, unclear household type, test data, etc.)⁷ and 36 people were identified as duplicates and removed.

Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) data from agencies in Delta and Montezuma Counties were used rather than the survey.

Data Definitions

To create this report, the HUD-provided definitions were used to create several variables during the cleaning process. Table 1 contains a list of all variables that were created and their HUD definitions.

Variable	HUD-Provided Definitions
Household Types	
Households without children	Households with adults only. This includes households composed of unaccompanied adults (including unaccompanied youth age 18 to 24) and multiple adults (including households with multiple youth ages 18 to 24).

Household with only children	Households composed exclusively of persons under age 18, including one-child households, multiple-child households, or other household configurations composed only of children.

	Has a disability.
Chronically homeless household	A household with at least one adult or minor head of household who is identified as chronically homeless. For households with more than one person, if one household member qualifies as chronically homeless, all

members of that household should be counted as chronically homeless.

Interpreting PIT Data

The PIT count provides a snapshot of homelessness on a single night in January. Due to the transient nature of the population and the large geographic area of the Balance of State region, it is extremely difficult to capture all individuals and families experiencing homelessness. In addition, there are likely unforeseen impacts on populations experiencing homelessness due in part to the ongoing impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic and due to the response to the COVID-19 pandemic by Federal, State, and local entities. Because of this, the 2022 PIT count should be considered an underrepresentation of sheltered homelessness in the Balance of State region.


The PIT survey relies on self-reporting which may impact the data. Individuals may be unwilling to disclose certain information or may not realize that they meet the criteria for a specific condition. Many of the disabling conditions included on the PIT survey are stigmatized which may lead to underreporting. Moreover, certain disabling conditions, such as mental health issues, brain injuries, or other socially and/or systemically stigmatized health factors may be especially under-reported among minority populations, which tend to be over-represented among people experiencing homelessness.

Finally, changes in populations experiencing homelessness year to year cannot be solely determined by examining PIT data. Each year, changes are made to the PIT methodology, primarily because of changes by HUD in data collection and recognition of more equitable ways to collect data. Subsequently, survey forms are changed to match these changing data standards. Additionally, local conditions such as the number of participating agencies, the number of volunteers, public health emergencies, and unseasonably warm or cool weather can impact both the number of individuals who seek shelter and the number of individuals included in the PIT count. Because of this, caution is recommended when comparing PIT count data over time. Increases or decreases in the homeless population may be due to methodology or changes in local conditions instead of true changes in the number of people experiencing homelessness.

Snapshot of 2022 PIT Data

787 Adults and children were counted in homeless shelters in the Balance of State region in 2022

This map shows all the counties in the Balance of State region. The labeled counties represent where the 787 people experiencing homelessness were living during the 2022 PIT Count. The counties with the largest share of people experiencing homelessness were Mesa (28%), Pueblo (19%), and Bent



Findings

All data reported in this section are based on completed surveys and HMIS tables. Given the limitations of the PIT count and the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic, the true number of people experiencing homelessness in the Balance of State (BoS) region is likely greater than what is reported here.

Across the BoS region, there were 787 sheltered homeless individuals, adults and children, in 2022. Of these people, 472 were observed in emergency shelters and 315 were staying in transitional housing programs. HUD groups individuals into one of three "household types" – households without children; households with at least one adult and one child; and households with only children. Children are defined as persons under 18. In 2022, the majority of households did not include children.

Demographics


This section contains demographic information about people experiencing homelessness in shelters the night of the 2022 PIT count and provides comparison data from the Colorado BoS region. The BoS regional data are from the 2019 Colorado Census. Throughout this section, only the demographic categories that matched between the Census and the PIT survey are included.

For the PIT survey, the head of household reported the age range for each household member - seniors (over age 55), adults (age 25-54), youth (age 18-24) or children (under 18). Because exact ages were not reported, average age cannot be reported. The majority of the people counted were adults 25 to 54 years old. A quarter of the population were seniors over age 55.

The following graph compares the percentage of people surveyed who were seniors (over age 55), adults (age 25-54), youth (age 18-24), or children (under 18) in the BoS region and among people experiencing homelessness. Compared to the general population in the BoS region, people experiencing homelessness on the night of the count were more likely to be adults or seniors. For example, seniors represent 18% of the general region's population but represent 25% of those experiencing homelessness based on the completed surveys.




Among those experiencing homelessness the night of the count, over half of the people surveyed identified as male.

The following graph compares the percentage of people surveyed who identified as male or female in the BoS region and among people experiencing homelessness. Please note that the Census does not provide data on individuals who identify as transgender or gender non-conforming. Because comparison data for the general population were not available, these gender identities are not included in the figure below.



Approximately 79% percent of those counted reported their race as White and twenty percent reported their ethnicity as Hispanic/Latino.



Homelessness disproportionately impacts people of color


Compared to the general population in the BoS region, people surveyed who are experiencing homelessness were more likely to report being of Black, African American, or Africa, multiple races, American



The following graph compares the ethnicity of people in the BoS region to people surveyed who are experiencing homelessness. For this graph, cases of missing data for ethnicity (n=84) are excluded.

Homelessness did not disproportionaly impact Hispanic people

Based on the data, the percentage of Hispanic people surveyed who are experiencing homelessness was similar to the percentage of Hispanic people in the BoS region.



Disabling Conditions and Sub-Populations


For each household member older than 18, the head of household reported the presence of serious mental illness, developmental disability, substance use disorder, HIV/AIDS, post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), brain injury, or chronic physical illness and/or disability. Sixty-six percent of the adults experiencing homelessness in shelters had one or more disabling conditions. The most commonly reported disabling conditions were PTSD and substance use disorder.

Among the people counted the night of the PIT count, there were several small but significant subpopulations. Approximately one out of seven adults were currently fleeing domestic violence and about one in ten were veterans.

Conclusion

The 2022 Point-in-Time (PIT) count was a success due to the hard work and dedication of staff and volunteers across Colorado. It is extremely difficult to gather PIT data due to the large geographic area of the Balance of State region and the transient nature of people experiencing homelessness. In addition, the COVID-19 pandemic continued to create unforeseen challenges for the 2022 PIT count.

While the 2022 PIT count should be considered a conservative estimate of the extent of homelessness in the region, the count provides valuable information about the people experiencing homelessness on the night of the count. There are many takeaways from the data contained in this report including:

- 787 homeless adults and children
- 12% of households were families with children
- 25% of individuals were under the age of 25
- 66% of adults reported at least one disabling condition
- 17% of adults were chronically homeless
- 12% of adults were currently fleeing domestic violence
- 10% of adults were veterans

The 2022 PIT Report also highlighted racial, age, and gender inequalities among those experiencing homelessness. Black, African American, or African people, people who identify as multiple races, and American Indian, Alaska Native, or Indigenous, and people make up a disproportionate amount of those experiencing homelessness compared to the general population in the Balance of State region. People who identify as male and older people were also overrepresented among those experiencing homelessness.

Additional data is included in the appendices. Appendix A includes information on household type, veteran status, disabling conditions, and chronic homelessness for each county and entitlement city. Appendix B provides a summary of the PIT data for each county. Appendix C provides a summary of the PIT data for each entitlement cities in the BoS region, Grand Junction and Pueblo. For the 2022 PIT Count, all data collected in Mesa County were collected in the city of Grand Junction and all data collected in Pueblo County were collected in the city of Pueblo. Because of this, the data reported for these counties and entitlement cities are identical throughout the appendices.

The 2022 PIT count provides required data for federal funding through the HUD Continuum of Care program. The data included in this report will be used by the Colorado Balance of State Continuum of Care and other stakeholders to inform additional outreach, service and program planning, and policy decision making as they work to address homelessness.
