In 1984, Kathleen Mullen* and Mary Ann Gleason founded the Colorado Coalition for the Homeless. They came together with community leaders across Denver to address shelters that were full, a growing number of people sleeping rough, and clear and unaddressed health needs of people experiencing homelessness.

Now—40 years later—we have much to celebrate even as the circumstances our community faced 40 years ago seem familiar. We started as a health clinic and grew into a housing provider when our clinicians pointed out that treatments would be much more effective if we could prescribe housing. The Coalition grew services to meet client needs. And our integrated health services came together to offer primary, behavioral, vision, dental, and psychiatric care to our clients.

This summer, I was able to observe our client access team exercise care in several of our locations. Recently, a client arrived at our Stout Street Health Center with multiple vulnerabilities and needs. Our experienced staff skillfully addressed their many health needs, provided quality primary and behavioral healthcare, and placed them into housing that evening. To see that teamwork and integrated care in real time is pretty amazing.

Over these decades, the Coalition has risen to the challenges and grown to meet the needs of people experiencing homelessness in new ways. We help build the body of evidence for practices that

work and bring together housing and healthcare in powerful combination toward lasting solutions. As this essential and missional work continues, we invite you to take a moment with us to celebrate the amazing work we have done together, as a community and as an organization, to resource basic human needs and grow hope for a better future.

Thank you to Kathleen and Mary Ann for launching us, to each person who has worked here and brought heart and professionalism to our care in the community, to those

who served as volunteers or board members.

The Coalition's integrated approach to addressing homelessness, by providing homes, health, and hope, remains a core principle in our commitment to finding lasting solutions to help end homelessness.





Celebrating 25 Years at Renaissance Children's Center

2024 is not only the 40th anniversary of the Colorado Coalition for the Homeless, but also the 25th anniversary of the award-winning Renaissance Children's Center (RCC), which serves low-income families and those experiencing homelessness with infants and children pre-school aged.



Located in Lakewood, the Renaissance Children's Center, a 6,600 square-foot facility, features eight naturally lit classrooms, two outdoor play areas, and a staff trained in a trauma-informed approach that emphasizes practical life skills, tools for academic achievement, and creative problem solving.

The center provides children with a safe and supportive environment that focuses on the vital skills needed for school readiness and to disrupt the cycle of homelessness.

The program uses both a child-directed curriculum and a social skills curriculum, which build emotional competence, social interactions, and academic learning that will serve them well throughout their lives.

The center also participates in the Child Nutrition/School Meal Program and provides a wonderfully varied menu, feeding children breakfast, lunch, and an afternoon snack daily. A professional chef onsite prepares meals. This unique facility serves not just the students, but families as well, by providing an onsite food pantry, access to case management in a new Family Resource Room, and onsite mental health therapy available to children and families. The center also partners with key local organizations to provide services, including with Therapy of the Rockies to provide speech and occupational therapy to children who qualify, and enrichment through the Culture of Wellness in Preschool program and the Jefferson County Library.



Renewal Village Opens

Renewal Village (formerly the Clarion Inn), located in the Globeville neighborhood of Denver, serves as home for hundreds of individuals each year. With the help of key government, private, and nonprofit partners, the Colorado Coalition for the Homeless made another leap forward in creating lasting solutions to homelessness.



One hundred and thirty-four (134) of the 215 units are allocated for permanent supportive housing, which provides ongoing wraparound supportive services to help individuals remain stably housed. A project-based voucher from the Colorado Division of Housing is attached to each supportive housing unit, ensuring that the tenant pays no more than 30% of their income on housing costs and that the property is affordable to residents at varying income levels. The remaining 81 units, including 60 designated for veterans and supported by the US Department of Veterans Affairs, are allocated for transitional or non-congregate shelter use, which is short-term placement for individuals as they move toward independent, long-term housing.

Reduce. Reuse. Renovate.

Conversion projects like Renewal Village have the advantage of bringing new permanent housing online more quickly than taking a new project from conception to completion. Also, the cost per unit of housing is typically less than half of new construction.

In addition, Renewal Village partnered with Energy Outreach Colorado to obtain efficient, programmable thermostats. The retrofitted LED lighting saves energy as well as cost.

Partnerships

For 40 years the Colorado Coalition for the Homeless has leveraged key partnerships to expand our reach. Collaborating closely with the Mayor's Office, the City and County of Denver, and like-minded nonprofit allies, CCH has been able to reach more communities in need of our vital services.

The 48th Avenue Health Center

The 48th Avenue Health Center, located in the City & County of Denver's 48th Ave Shelter managed by the Denver Rescue Mission, is designed to serve clients living in the shelter environment as well as those in the surrounding neighborhood. As with the other CCH Health Centers, the primary conditions clients receive services for include hypertension, diabetes, mental health disorders, and substance use disorders.

Initial funding for the center was provided by Emergency Solutions Grant (COVID) funds, also known as ESG-CV, part of the Federal CARES Act, and through Denver's Department of Housing Stability (HOST) to address homelessness and housing. In 2024, the Biden-Harris Administration provided an additional \$982,224 investment in the Center through the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA), an agency within the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS).

Today, the Coalition maintains all operating costs, but pays zero rent or utilities for the facility. The City of Denver paid for all recent upgrades to the property.





Collaboration with the City and County of Denver


In 2024, CCH continued and deepened collaborative efforts between the Mayor's Office, Denver's Office of Housing Stability (HOST), the Denver Street Outreach Collaborative (DSOC), and Stout Street Health Center (SSHC) to intervene quickly and at scale with alternatives to unsheltered homelessness and survival in large encampments, integrated healthcare in transitional sites, and stabilizing case management services in housing. Initially coordinated under the Mayor's Office's House 1000 (H1K) campaign in 2023, these emergency resources and approaches developed in 2024 into the All In Mile High (AIMH) initiative.

In 2024, CCH provided integrated health care services at nine AIMH sites, serving 705 individuals over 2,276 encounters. Using the Health Outreach Program (HOP) mobile clinic, and street medicine teams, CCH brought primary care, behavioral health, psychiatry, substance use treatment, pharmacy, nursing, and complex care coordination directly to patients at AIMH facilities.

In partnership with the Mayor's Office, HOST, and other homeless service providers, DSOC staffed a pilot effort to engage and move interested households into apartments directly from encampments within 30 days with post-housing case management support. This Encampment Resolution was complemented by Housing Central Command (HCC), which expanded the pathway to housing navigation, Rapid Rehousing, housing subsidies, and stabilization case management across the entire portfolio of AIMH Non-Congregate Shelter and Micro Community locations. DSOC's Stabilization Case Management team offered individualized support to 117 clients transitioning into housing, helping them access healthcare and benefits, resolve tenancy challenges, build daily living skills, connect with employment, and lay the foundation for longterm housing stability.

Building upon 23 years of previous experience and trust with individuals surviving outdoors, CCH outreach, case management, and medical staff quickly realigned with the new facilities, resources, and processes inaugurated and implemented by AIMH in 2024.




2024 Legislative Session Summary

Public policy engagement and advocacy has always been a longstanding priority for the Colorado Coalition for the Homeless, and 2024 was no different.

In the lead up to and during the 2024 legislative session, the Education and Advocacy (E&A) Team promoted its mission of preventing and resolving homelessness, increasing access to healthcare and housing, and creating pathways to greater stability by shaping public policy, building strategic community relationships, and influencing the public narrative about the causes of and solutions to homelessness.

fourth (74th) General Assembly included debate on over 700 bills, 25% of which were tracked by the Coalition. E&A team members actively engaged on 58 bills and led efforts to advance three priority bills. These three bills were the focus of the 2024 CCH Lobby Day, which was attended by over 100 individuals from the Coalition's Advocacy Network of engaged community members and Advocacy Committee of internal CCH staff.

HB24-1099: Defendant Filing Fees in Evictions

passed with bipartisan sponsorship. This bill eliminates the eviction answer filing fee for tenants facing eviction and benefits the roughly 50,000 Coloradans facing eviction each year by making the process less intimidating, less stigmatizing, less expensive, and less likely to result in homelessness.

HB24-1322: Medicaid Coverage Housing & Nutrition Services also passed and requires the Department of Health Care Policy and Financing to conduct a feasibility study to determine whether to seek federal authorization to provide services that address Medicaid members' health-related social needs.

In addition to Lobby Day participation, CCH supporters sent 700 messages to legislators to encourage outcomes for key legislation. Organizational representatives also provided live or written testimony on 25 bills during this session.

SB24-211: Improvements to the Colorado Necessary Documents Program would have reduced administrative burdens for people experiencing homelessness who need access to vital documents. Unfortunately, SB24-211 failed in 2024, but became a top-of-list priority for the 2025 session.

Colorado tax credit programs including the Child Care Contribution Tax Credit (CCCTC) or the Homeless Contribution Tax Credit (HCTC) can further reduce your state tax liability. Your gift of appreciated stock can be deducted at the current market value of the stock, allowing you to avoid capital gains taxes. Stock gifts valued at more than \$5,000 or more also qualify for the 25% HCTC, creating an additional benefit on your Colorado taxes.

A Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) from your IRA meets your required minimum payout, avoids taxation, and qualifies for Colorado tax credits.





Net Assets


